On November 28th these four athletes competed in the 4th annual Special Olympics Virtual Curling

Competition, held across BC. There were 43 teams registered in all, and our Creston DrawCats finished fifth in the A/B Division. Congratulations to these exceptional curlers.

In a virtual competition, the ends are set up the same for all participants based on a pre-determined layout. The aim is to score as many points against the virtual team as possible. A skip still calls shots and rocks are swept as usual. Although the team scored 3 points that night, they followed the same layout the following week and won more points than the first place team!

Tips for registering

Registration is now open for the winter 2024/5 season. We have our usual line up of leagues and one change. Thursday nights will be an open drop-in league – you can read about it in the article called Thursday Scramble on page 6.

Curling will run from Friday January 3 until Friday March 21. We've made a few changes in the registration process. You'll see some new questions and we talk about them below.

Registration is open until December 25. You can register on <u>https://creston.curling.io</u>. When you register:

- If you have a team:
 - include your skip's first AND last name
 - communicate with your other teammates so you're all on the same page about who's curling on whose team
- If you don't have a team, you can still register. Just type "no team" and say what position(s) you prefer to play. We suggest you also contact our Registration director, Diane, directly or send an email to crestoncurling@gmail.com. We will do our best to get you on a team.

You can pay by credit card, cash, personal cheque, or e-transfer to <u>crestoncurling@gmail.com</u>. Remember you must pay before the season starts.

There are three new questions on the registration form. You must answer them before you can complete the process. If you register for multiple leagues, you can simply type "see above" or something similar after the first league registration.

READY FOR 2025?

Have you registered for the new year? Remember to pay all curling fees before the curling session begins (i.e., before Jan 3, 2025). Curlers whose payments have not been received by Jan 2, 2025 will not be allowed to curl until payment has been received and will also be charged a late fee of \$50

- **Sparing availability**: If you are available to spare, please include the league(s) you would be available to spare for and the position you prefer.
- Volunteering: Our club runs because we have a dedicated crew of volunteers but we always welcome fresh faces! If you can help out in any aspect, please offer to volunteer. Include the area(s) you would like to help with, for example, bonspiels, clinics, youth curling, bartending, League rep, novice clinics, etc. If you are unable to volunteer simply type "none".
- Do we have your permission to share your contact info with other league members and to use your photo(s) for marketing purposes: This is mostly self-explanatory but your phone number and email address may be shared for things like sparing, or communication between teams in case of cancellation. Pictures would generally be posted on our website or Facebook to showcase events at the club.

See you on the ice! In the meantime, from your board to all of you we wish you a Merry Christmas and Happy Holiday Season.

New to curling?

This fall we held two events for people interested in learning to curl: a novice league held over three weekends, and one day rookie curling clinic.

Between the two events, we had 25 new people on the ice learning the sport. The rookie curlers also joined us on Thursday evenings to put their new skills to good use.

If you know someone new to curling encourage them to come out to future clinics. In the new

year, the Thursday night league will be a drop-in night and we anticipate a mixture of new and experienced curlers. Teams will be formed each night in a random selection so it will be a great way to integrate into the club and curling.



Etiquette tips of the month:

- When your opponents are preparing for delivery, stand to the side of the sheet, single file and between the hog lines. Move only after the rock has been released.
- If you are throwing next you may stand on the backboard, but remain quiet and out of sight of the opposition thrower.

Welcoming future curlers

Many of you remember our successful junior and youth curling programme. Our high school teams curled in the playdowns and often went on to the Provincials. The programme was paused, mostly due to COVID and we're working hard to bring the joy of curling back to our local youth.

Our volunteer coaches are slowly rebuilding the foundation, beginning with invitations to elementary and high school students to come and try out curling. Even with the limited classroom time (one hour) we're getting great feedback so far that the students are really enjoying their short time on the ice! after Doug who was born in Creston and was an avid curler and advocate for the sport all his life until his death in 2015.

We welcomed teams from Castlegar, Trail, Kimberley, and Nelson as well as 14 local teams, all competing for a purse the totalled \$12,500. Most teams received a cash prize and team payouts ranged from \$200 to \$1700 (not including \$800 in Calcutta payouts). The prizes were hard-earned. From the first draw to the last, we watched some nail biting games with ties decided by exciting groundhog finishes.

It was wonderful to have the diverse team makeups. We had nine men's teams, six mixed teams, two senior teams, one ladies team and two junior teams. The C Final was fun to watch Not only was it an exciting finish, but a junior team played a senior team. Congratulations to the Reynolds team who finished second in C. 

Introducing Thursday Scramble! It's Open drop-in night of fun curling and will begin at 7:00 on Thursday January 9. It's open to everyone: men and women, new and experienced curlers. You don't need a team to play. We'll organize teams based on who arrives to curl each week. Curlers who are willing to skip will be teamed up with a randomly selected team of curlers.

You must have paid your Curl BC fees to play. Curlers who haven't paid the fees this year can pay them on curling.io. Just choose Thursday Scramble League Winter 24/25. Otherwise, it's \$10 a game, payable when you arrive each night.

If you have a friend who would like to try curling, bring them along. They can curl once without paying the Curl BC fees, however, they will need to register in the visitor book, and pay their \$1.00 insurance for the night.

This will be a fun night of curling, and we hope to see many familiar faces along with lots of enthusiastic new curlers from the fall clinics!
