As we slide into the last week of league play, it's a good time to look back on the last six months of curling. I think we can safely call it a successful year!

Bonspiel season stretched from November to March with six bonspiels, including the inaugural Wild Chicken open-mixed and last weekend's funspiel.

We introduced 25 new curlers to the sport with two novice leagues/ clinics. Thursday night opened the door to drop-in curling. Both experienced and new curlers were assigned randomly to teams and many new curlers returned week after week. We had around 100 people curl through the winter, with 15 who were new to curling and had some special coaching to get comfortable on the ice. Thanks Pete, for teaching these new curlers.

Nearly 150 local students came to the rink to learn how to curl. Several

of them expressed interest in continuing to curl and we hope to see more of them in the 2025-26 season. We also had nine international exchange students and the Creston Valley Thundercats on the ice to learn to curl.

Extending our time curling



Did you ever wonder how the delivery stick was created?

Come out to the club any day and you'll see more and more curlers using a stick.
Did you ever wonder how the delivery stick was created?

It started in 1997. Roberta Drew, from the Huntsville

Curling Club could no longer get into the hack. At that time, curlers would try to throw a rock using their broom turned upside down. But they couldn't give the rock a turn and it was not accurate. Despite not curling himself, her husband, "Rusty" Drew fitted a broomstick with a hinged plastic moulded clip to fit over the rock's handle. This allowed the curler to deliver the rock accurately and with a turn. Roberta named it the ExtendeR because it extended a player's curling years. After some finetuning based on suggestions from curlers at the club Rusty submitted the ExtendeR to Curling Canada. Within two months they approved the curling stick for play.

The ExtendeR caught on quickly, but the wheelchair community especially embraced it. In 1998/99 wheelchair curling associations formed and they endorsed the ExtendeR. Three years later in 2002, Switzerland held the first ever Wheelchair Curling Championships.

The basic ExtendeR sold for \$50. Sales for jumped from 37 in the first year to over 11,000 devices worldwide four years later. Today, many of us would no longer be able to curl without a delivery stick.

The Canadian Stick Curling Championships will be held in Grande Prairie April 2-6. And we'll be cheering on Chris Jenson and Randy DeJong who are representing Creston at the BC Interior/Pacific Masters combined curling championship next week.
